Educational materials that are openly licensed and freely available for anyone to use and reuse.

- Modules
- Infographics
- Podcasts
- Courseware
- Visualizations
- Question banks and quizzes
- Software
- Tools, materials, techniques

# Format type isn't as important as licensing.


Any resources can be used for learning.

### The (potential) result...

54%	Not purchase the required text	
30%	Earn a lower grade	
27%	Take fewer courses	
26%	Not register for a specific course	
17%	Drop or withdraw from a course	8

## Improved teaching

- Customized to learning outcomes and course structure (<u>Jung, Bauer, and Heaps 2017</u>)
- Improves teaching (Pitt 2015)
- Can be updated as needed
- Potential increased impact

# Improved learning

- Contextual, nuanced material (<u>Guring 2017</u>)
- Increased engagement
- Improved performance (<u>Jhangiani</u>, <u>Dastur</u>, <u>La</u>
   <u>Grand</u>, <u>Penner 2018</u>, <u>Morales and Baker 2018</u>)
- Immediate access
- Flexible formats

# What sort of projects can I support?

- Assisting with finding, curating, and evaluating open materials for existing or proposed courses
- Interpreting open (Creative Commons) and traditional licensing and copyright
- Migrating self-created textbooks or course materials into more accessible, open formats (while preserving copyright / IP)

## A few last words...
